Political analyst Wali Mohammad also weighed in, stating that girls' education is vital for Afghanistan's development. He said, "A progressive and prosperous Afghanistan is only possible with educated women and men." He stressed that girls' education is not only essential for their personal growth but also for the economic and social advancement of society. He added, "We hope that the interim government will reopen

Following a meeting on Afghanistan in Geneva, Switzerland, G7 special envoys issued a joint statement calling for the restoration of women's rights and urging the Islamic Emirate to fight terrorism. They confirmed the actions of the IEA against Daesh but stressed the need for more decisive measures.

China to impose visa restrictions on US officials as countermeasures over HK-related issues: Chinese FM

China has decided to impose visa restrictions on US personnel who have acted egregiously on Hong Kong-related issues, in accordance with the Law on Foreign Relations of the People's Republic of China and the Anti-Foreign Sanctions Law of the People's Republic of China, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said on Tuesday when she was asked about specific countermeasures in light of the US announcement to impose new visa restrictions on Hong Kong officials for implementing the National Security Law (NSL) for Hong Kong.

Washington said last month it would impose fresh sanctions on Hong Kong officials responsible for implementing the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR)'s national security law following the jailing of 45 people for subversion, according to RTHK, one of Hong Kong region's major broadcasters. In November, 45 people convicted of "conspiracy to subvert state power" were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from 50 months to 10 years in Hong Kong.

Mao said that China has made clear our serious position on relevant moves of the US side. The US used Hong Kongrelated issues to slap visa restrictions on Chinese officials, which grossly interferes in China's internal affairs and seriously violates the principles of international law and the basic norms



of international relations, Mao added. In accordance with the Law on Foreign Relations of the People's Republic of China and the Anti-Foreign Sanctions Law of the People's Republic of China, China decided to impose visa restrictions on US personnel who have acted egregiously on Hong Kongrelated issues, Mao said.

Mao said that it must be stressed that Hong Kong is China's Hong Kong and Hong Kong affairs are purely China's internal affairs. We urge the US to earnestly respect China's sovereignty, respect Hong Kong's rule of law and stop meddling in Hong Kong affairs in

whatever form, Mao said.

China remains unwavering in its determination to safeguard the nation's sovereignty, security and development interests, to implement One Country, Two Systems, and to oppose any external interference in Hong Kong's affairs, Mao said.

In a November press conference, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said in response to US' taking steps to impose new visa restrictions on multiple Hong Kong officials that, China's central government firmly supports the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region in safeguarding national security and punishing various activities that endanger national security in accordance with law. Lin warned that if the US insists on imposing visa restrictions on Hong Kong officials, China will take firm countermeasures.

Washington played a detrimental role in exacerbating the riots in Hong Kong in 2019, actively fueling the unrest, and in a certain sense, the NSL for Hong Kong is specifically aimed at addressing the instigating actions by the external forces behind these disturbances, Lü Xiang, a research fellow at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, told the Global Times on Tuesday.

Since the implementation of the NSL in 2020, Hong Kong has emerged from the shadow of turmoil and is now at a crucial stage of recovery, he said. Therefore, any attempt by the US to undermine the security, stability, and development of Hong Kong at this time will be met with countermeasures from the Chinese side, Lü said.

The implementation of the NSL is currently at a critical juncture, with recent developments including the Jimmy Lai case and the verdict on the "35-plus" defendants, he added. The countermeasures from China convey the message that if the US obstructs its efforts to pursue peace and development in HKSAR, it will certainly respond with reciprocal actions, Lü noted.

Pat Elder (Elder), an investigative reporter and director of the website Military Poisons, told the Global Times (GT) that toxic "forever chemicals," known as PFAS, or perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, are flowing from US military bases across the US and in other countries where US bases are stationed and that they are contaminating the local environment and putting people's lives at risk. Elder has been investigating US military base contamination domestically and internationally for years. In an interview with GT reporter Wang Wenwen in her I-Talk show, Elder shared his findings. GT: In recent years, you have dedicated yourself to investigating contamination at US military bases, both domestically and internationally. What prompted you to start looking into this issue?

GT: You have particularly looked into the military contamination at US bases in Japan. What did you find? What has been the reaction of the locals?

Elder: In Misawa, we found a pond that drains runoff from the Misawa Air Base. When we tested the water, we found 1,400 parts per trillion (ppt) of PFOS, a type of PFAS. In the US, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recommends drinking water has no more than 4 ppt of PFOS. In Japan, the limit is 50 ppt for both drinking water and river water. 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Afghanistan's Pomegranate Exports Hit \$33 Million, But Challenges Persist

The Ministry of Industry and Commerce reported that in the first eight months of the current solar year (1403), Afghanistan exported over \$33 million worth of pomegranates.

Akhundzada Abdul Salam Jawad, spokesperson for the Ministry of Industry and Commerce, stated that most pomegranate exports were sent to Pakistan, India, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan, Kazakhstan, and the United Arab Emirates.

The spokesperson said: "Afghanistan exported approximately 63,000 tons of pomegranates over eight months in 1403, valued at \$33.3 million. The exports were made to countries including India, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Iraq, the UAE,



Kazakhstan, and Uzbekistan.' Some orchard owners who traveled to Kabul from provinces to sell their pomegranate produce said that while pomegranate yields increased this year, the market for selling the fruit remained sluggish.

Zia-ul-Haq, an orchard owner from Farah province, stated: "This year, our yields were high, but the problem is that there's no proper market for selling." Mohammad Zarif, another

"We paid 70,000 afghani in rent. The municipality charges 300 afghani per ton, there are seven to eight checkpoints along the way that collect 700 to 800 afghani, and transport costs us 1,000 afghani."

Meanwhile, some traders highlighted that due to trade challenges with Pakistan, pomegranate exports decreased this year. They urged the Islamic Emirate's officials to establish alternative trade routes and activate air corridors to boost exports.

Mohammad Agha Sadat, a trader, told TOLOnews: "We can't even cover our expenses. One major issue is the low value of the Pakistani rupee, with 1,000 rupees equaling 240 afghani.

of their retirement status, their pensions will be paid according to a scheduled timeline.

The deputy spokesperson said: "If the retiree is an employee of a non-budgetary unit, they must submit their application to the relevant department, and the special courts must respond to their request. Similarly, the Commission for Organizational Structure and Salary Management has been tasked with preparing a schedule to prevent budgetary pressure. The special courts will issue rulings based on this schedule." Retirees expressed satisfaction with the issuance of this decree, urging authorities to expedite the court proceedings to resolve their problems quickly. Nazifa, a retiree, told: "This is great news, and we are very happy. They should pay our pensions quickly because it's winter, and we have nothing at home."

Amirullah, another retiree, stated: "Justice must be served, and it should be determined who is eligible and who is not. We are even willing to go to the special court because we served honestly."

It is worth mentioning that in Hamal (solar calendar) of this year, the leader of the Islamic Emirate issued a decree instructing military and civilian institutions of the interim government not to deduct retirees' pensions from employees' monthly salaries.

According to statistics, the number of retirees in the country currently exceeds 150,000, with their annual pensions estimated to cost over 12 billion afghani.

bioaccumulates in aquatic life. According to the EPA, fish can bioaccumulate PFOS at levels up to 4,000 times the concentration found in the water. For example, if a water sample shows 10 ppt of PFOS, the fish in that area might have 40,000 ppt in their flesh. In Misawa, the stream we tested leads to a fishing lake where locals fish. With 1,400 ppt of PFOS in the water, the fish are clearly at risk, even without testing them directly. That's the reality we're dealing with. In Japan, people say, "It's just

not fair. We're not allowed on the bases, and they're picking on us. We're like colonial subjects here in Japan, and the Americans are contaminating our water, poisoning us. There's nothing we can do."

GT: When you did your investigations, what obstacles did vou face?

Elder: In Japan, the obstacles were numerous. I carried out testing and gave talks in 14 cities, and my message was clear: The US military is poisoning your water, your fish and your food. When I was getting ready to leave and head back to the US, I was at Osaka airport. As I was waiting to board, they called my name and I had to go to a special room. They told me they needed to examine me for explosives. This had also happened to me in Ireland seven years ago, after I had been speaking in Germany about the

wire, electric wiring, and signs that say, "If you come inside this fence, we can shoot you." I just wanted to take environmental samples and test the water. It's not really worth getting shot, so I stayed outside the bases. It was threatening in that regard.

Also, after I published a story about the Navy in August, I was no longer able to access Navy environmental sites, and I still can't today. They are apparently reading my IP address and blocking me.

GT: In a recent article, you said the US Navy has contaminated your blood. Could you provide more details? We rarely see reports on PFAS in the mainstream media in the US and Japan, Why?

Elder: Almost five years ago, I tested the water in my backyard. I live by the beach on Chesapeake Bay, and about 600 meters across the water is a Navy base where they use firefighting foam. The foam washes up on my beach every day, but at the time, I didn't know it was carcinogenic. I ate a lot of oysters, crabs and fish. That's how I ended up with high levels of PFAS in my blood.

I sent the story to the Washington Post. the New York Times and the Baltimore Sun. No one paid attention. I even gave them the scientific report. Only one outlet. Bay Journal, picked it up, and the reporter interviewed an official from Maryland's Department of the Environment. The quote from the Maryland official was: "If there is any PFAS in the water, it's probably from a landfill or a municipal firehouse." Well, the landfill is 11 miles away, nowhere near the water. The firehouse is 5 miles away, also nowhere near the water.

The US Navy, however, is only 600 meters away, and it's welldocumented that they used firefighting foam there for years. So, the state was clearly covering for the Navy.

I see the same thing in every nation: Japan, South Korea, Germany. Two years ago, very few people outside of experts with PhDs in universities had even heard of PFAS in Japan. The US has absolute control over Japan - not just militarily, but culturally as well. It seems that the US government has been able to control the thought by controlling the media. The media doesn't report on it, so people remain unaware. GT: Victims of PFAS in the US

and abroad are struggling to seek compensation from the US military. Why do you think it is that difficult to get justice?

Elder: The US military is deeply concerned with liability. An F-35 fighter jet costs about \$90 million to \$100 million. Many of the ballistic missiles they're setting up in Japan, pointed at China, also cost millions of dollars, and the stockpiling of those missiles costs billions.

If they start seriously addressing all the issues - liver cancer, kidney cancer, uterine cancer, testicular cancer, thyroid cancer – and begin to earnestly care for all the service members in the US military and the communities they've poisoned, then they won't have enough money left to build the missiles they are setting up which are pointed at China. Do you think it's any more difficult or complicated than that? They don't want to maximize the issue. They want to save face. These guys are masters of propaganda.



"Soon, those Ukrainians who want to fight will run out, in my opinion, soon there will be no one left who wants to fight. We are ready, but the other side needs to be ready for both negotiations and compromises."

Reuters reported last month that Putin was open to discussing a Ukraine ceasefire deal with Trump, but ruled out making any major territorial concessions and insisted Kyiv abandon its ambitions to join NATO. Putin said on Thursday that Russia had no conditions to start talks with Ukraine and was ready to negotiate with anyone, including President Volodymyr Zelenskiy. But he said any deal could only be signed with Ukraine's legitimate authorities, which for now the Kremlin considered to be only the Ukrainian parliament.

Pakistan's Foreign Ministry on Saturday dismissed as unfounded and "devoid of rationality" assertions by a senior U.S. official that its missile programme could eventually pose a threat to the United States, Reuters reported. Earlier this week, U.S. Deputy National Security Adviser Jon Finer said Pakistan's development of long-range ballistic missiles made it an "emerging threat". Finer's comments, which came a day after Washington announced a new round of sanctions related to the ballistic missile programme, underscored the deterioration in once-close ties between Washington and Islamabad since the 2021 U.S. troop withdrawal from Afghanistan.

Addressing Finer's remarks, Pakistan's Foreign Ministry said the perception of an alleged threat was "unfortunate". "These allegations are unfounded, devoid of rationality and sense of history," the ministry added in a statement.

It also highlighted Pakistan's long history of cooperation with the U.S., particularly in counter-terrorism efforts, and reiterated its commitment to engaging constructively on all issues, including regional security and stability, read the report.

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
