# Afghan FM: Russia Officially Recognizes Caretaker Afghanistan Government

that Moscow officially recognizes the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA). The ministry quoted Zhirnov as emphasizing the significance of this decision and describing it as a historic step toward strengthening relations between Afghanistan and Russia.

During the meeting, Muttaqi also welcomed Russia's decision and described it as the beginning of a new phase of positive relations, mutual respect, and constructive engagement between the two countries. Muttaqi added that this realistic decision by Russia

would be remembered as a major development in the history of bilateral relations and would serve as a good example for other countries to take similar steps. He further stated that this move would lead to the further expansion of bilateral cooperation... **P2**

## Deputy PM for Economic Affairs Visits Baku International Sea Port

Mawlavi Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, Deputy Prime Minister for Economic Affairs, visited the Baku International Sea Port in Azerbaijan today. According to the Economic Affairs Office, Baradar reviewed the port's facilities and logistics and requested Azerbaijani officials to facilitate the export of Afghan goods via the corridor. During the visit—attended by port and railway officials—they expressed readiness to handle exports of Afghanistan's industrial, agricultural, and mineral products to Turkey and Europe through the Lapis Lazuli corridor.



## UK to Pay £1.6 Million Compensation to Afghans Over Risky Data Leak

The UK government will pay £1.6 million to 277 Afghans after a 2021 data leak exposed their identities and endangered their lives. British media have reported that the UK government will pay compensation of up to £4,000 each to 277 Afghan citizens whose personal information was exposed in a 2021 data breach by the Ministry of Defence (MoD). According to the BBC World Service, the breach occurred in September 2021, during the chaotic and rapid evacuation of Western forces from Afghanistan. Personal details of individuals who had cooperated with the UK government were mistakenly revealed, placing them at serious risk. The emails, sent by the Afghan Relocations and Assistance Policy (ARAP) team, exposed personal



data of nearly 300 Afghan nationals. Among the disclosed details were email addresses of 265 individuals, and in some cases, profile photos and geographic locations were also visible. The Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) labeled the breach as "serious" and warned that the error could have posed a threat to lives. As a result, the MoD

was fined £350,000 in December 2023—an amount reduced from an initial penalty of £1 million following a detailed review. UK Defence Minister Luke Pollard has issued a formal apology and assured that compensation payments would be processed swiftly. He also pledged reforms in data management... **P2**

## Washington Must Take Real Action to Cancel Export Restrictions on China: Global Times Editorial

On Friday, China's Ministry of Commerce announced that China and the US have recently confirmed details on a framework for implementing the Geneva trade talks consensus. China will review and approve applications for the export of eligible controlled items in accordance with the law, and the US will remove a series of restrictive measures imposed on China accordingly. Before China released its statement, US President Donald Trump and Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick made separate comments, claiming that the two sides had "signed an agreement." The easing of China-US trade tensions immediately drove up international financial markets, sending a clear signal: Free trade, not tariff barriers, is the common expectation of global markets; China-US trade reconciliation not only benefits both sides, but also serves the common interests of the entire world. This marks the latest progress in implementing the consensus reached between the two heads of state. The economic and trade teams of the two countries held talks from June 9 to 10 in London and reached a principled agreement on implementing the important consensus of the two heads of state and consolidating the outcomes of the Geneva talks. The statements from both sides indicate that the framework outcomes of the London talks have been recognized and approved in both countries, and both sides have further finalized the details of the framework. This shows that the China-US economic and trade consultations are proceeding along an established track, bringing a sigh of relief to the world. Providing an institutional platform for resolving differences is the important value of the China-US economic and trade consultation mechanism. Every piece of progress in bilateral trade talks has been met with "unanimous praise" from around the world, proving that

dialogue and cooperation are the only correct choices. However, the US often says one thing and does another, casting a shadow over the prospects of the two countries' economic and trade consultations.

For example, in the Joint Statement on China-US Economic and Trade Meeting in Geneva, China and the US both affirmed a "sustainable, long-term, and mutually beneficial economic and trade relationship." But at the same time, the US has repeatedly sent signals that could "intensify trade tensions" — at one moment, there was talk of revoking waivers for global semiconductors to access US technology in China; at another, there were hints of potential sanctions or export restrictions on DeepSeek, which could "be disruptive both diplomatically and economically." If Washington is truly committed to building a "sustainable, long-term, and mutually beneficial economic and trade relationship" with China, it should further demonstrate its clear stance on removing export restrictions on China and take real action — instead of resorting to ambiguity and vague wording. Some US public opinion places the blame for China-US trade frictions on China, which is a serious distortion of the truth. If it were not for the US' abuse of tariffs, there would not be the current severe difficulties in bilateral trade relations. Washington is the one that created the problem. China's willingness to sit down for consultations stems from goodwill toward the overall China-US relationship in addressing US concerns on a legal, reasonable, and sensible basis. However, some US public opinion seems to take this goodwill for granted, and even attempts to use China's goodwill to hijack the country — as if every time there is a problem in China-US trade, it is because "China is not doing enough or doing it fast enough." It is highly unfair to place all



the blame on China.

The essence of China-US economic and trade relations is mutual benefit and win-win cooperation. In fact, the US agreeing to reduce and remove unreasonable tariff barriers is itself an acknowledgment of the irreplaceable role of free trade in economic growth and a correction of its abuse of tariffs. The US itself has not been immune to the impact of so-called "reciprocal tariffs" on the global economy. From manufacturing plants and exporters to consumers, there are countless examples of the US' tariff stick hitting its own production and supply chains. A report by Rabobank shows that in the past six months, more than a quarter of Dutch investors have reduced their holdings in US shares due to unpredictable and unreliable US policies. Under the "education" of market forces, Washington has, in fact, been forced to gradually rein in its unilateralist impulse for "Liberation Day." From Geneva to London, China has consistently acted as a responsible major country, advancing China-US trade in a justified, firm and proportionate manner. This promotes a return to the WTO system, the normalization of global production and supply chains and the return of bilateral relations to the right track. The recently concluded Summer Davos Forum in Tianjin attracted leaders from

the political, business and academic communities of more than 90 countries and regions worldwide. At a time when unilateralist tariffs are impacting the global trade order, China continues to prove through concrete actions that it is not only "the largest trading partner for many countries beyond their immediate neighbors," but also a key engine and stabilizing force for global economic growth.

China-US relations are now at a crucial juncture. Both sides must especially adhere to the principles of mutual respect, peaceful coexistence and win-win cooperation, turning the "framework of measures" into a "list of achievements." Politicizing economic and trade issues and treating everything as a "bargaining chip in negotiations with China" will only hinder the rational resolution of economic and trade frictions. Only on the basis of common actions can we enhance mutual trust and create favorable conditions for future cooperation. It is hoped that the US side will meet China halfway, fully implementing the important consensus and requirements from the June 5 phone call between the two heads of state, further leveraging the role of the China-US economic and trade consultation mechanism and bringing more positive expectations to the world.

18 hours after the July Fourth crisis began, Texas Governor Greg Abbott said search-and-rescue operations would press on through the night and into Saturday.

Abbott said resources devoted to the effort would be "limitless." ## Kazakhstan Pledges \$500 Million Investment in Torghundi–Herat Railway Project

Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar, Deputy Prime Minister for Economic Affairs, met on Friday with the Prime Minister of Kazakhstan Olzhas Bektenov in Khankendi, Azerbaijan, where both sides discussed political, economic, and trade issues between Afghanistan and Kazakhstan, the Afghan deputy PM's office said in a statement.

At the meeting, the Prime Minister of Kazakhstan announced that his country will soon begin the Torghandi–Herat railway line project in Afghanistan, with an investment valued at \$500 million.

He emphasized that Kazakhstan is one of the top ten countries with the highest trade relations with Afghanistan and they are committed to expanding these relations.

Bektenov also stated that his country maintains good relations with Afghanistan, and to strengthen these ties, the Kazakh Foreign Minister will soon visit Kabul. During the meeting, Abdul Ghani Baradar described Kazakhstan as



an important and reliable regional partner for Afghanistan and called the appointment of Kazakhstan's special representative for Afghanistan a valuable step. Baradar expressed gratitude to Kazakhstan for supporting Afghanistan in international forums and said Afghanistan serves as an important transit route for Kazakhstan to the

Middle East and South Asia. According to him, Kazakhstan can connect Afghanistan to Europe, and therefore, Kazakhstan should take advantage of existing opportunities in investment, trade, railway projects, and transit affairs.

He also considered the signing of the agricultural products preservation and quarantine agreement between

the two countries important for increasing bilateral trade volume to \$3 billion. Baradar stressed facilitating visa issuance for Afghans and the opening of Afghan bank accounts in Kazakhstan's Zaman and Freedom Banks. He assured that Afghan banks are fully prepared for these collaborations.

Baradar noted that Afghanistan has initiated the establishment of an operational company for imports and exports via railways to expand bilateral trade and will soon introduce it to Kazakhstan.

He added that a draft agreement on international transport and transit between the two countries has been prepared, serious discussions are underway regarding tariff reductions on transit goods, and cooperation agreements in industrial, trade, and transport sectors with Iran, Kazakhstan, and Turkmenistan have been formulated, with Kazakhstan's cooperation being significant in these areas.

Meanwhile, the Pakistani government has announced that the issue of extending Afghan migrants' Proof of Registration (PoR) cards is under review, and relevant institutions have been warned not to take any action against PoR cardholders until a final decision is made.

Malak Awal Shinwari, an Afghan migrant in Pakistan, said: "Among the issues migrants face are the actions of Pakistani police, especially against those who have PoR cards. These individuals should not be expelled, yet in some areas, the police are creating difficulties for Afghan

migrants."

Atiqullah Mansoor, another Afghan migrant in Pakistan, said: "Our request to the Islamic Emirate is to act as soon as possible and engage with the host country's foreign ministry to simplify the visa and extension process for Afghan migrants."

In the wake of the ongoing mass return of migrants, the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) has warned that the return of over 1.4 million individuals this year has led to an unprecedented increase in the need for emergency assistance.

According to the agency, over one million people have been returned from Iran alone. In a statement, the UNHCR said: "UNHCR, the UN Refugee

Agency, is urgently seeking funding to protect over 1.4 million people who have returned or been forced to return to Afghanistan so far this year, including over 1 million from Iran."

Nazar Nazari, a migration rights activist, said: "Supporting migrants is a moral, humanitarian, and essential responsibility. The international community must take strong and effective action in this regard."

Iranian media, citing the governor of Taybad, reported that 38,000 Afghan migrants are deported daily through the Dogharoon border crossing. He also stated that over 500,000 individuals have been expelled through this route so far.

Despite Musk's deep pockets, breaking the Republican-Democratic duopoly will be a tall order, given that it has dominated American political life for more than 160 years, while Trump's approval ratings in polls in his second term have generally held firm above 40 percent, despite often divisive policies.

# Musk Announces Forming of 'America Party' in Further Break From Trump

The tattered bromance between Republican President Donald Trump and his main campaign financier Elon Musk took another fractious turn on Saturday when the space and automotive billionaire announced the formation of a new political party, saying Trump's "big, beautiful" tax bill would bankrupt America.

A day after asking his followers on his X platform whether a new U.S. political party should be created, Musk declared in a post on Saturday that "Today, the America Party is formed to give you back your freedom."

"By a factor of 2 to 1, you want a new political party and you shall have it!" he wrote.

The announcement from Musk comes after Trump signed his self-styled "big, beautiful" tax-cut and spending bill into law on Friday, which Musk fiercely opposed. Musk, who became the world's richest

man thanks to his Tesla car company and his SpaceX satellite firm, spent hundreds of millions on Trump's re-election and led the Department of Government Efficiency from the start of the president's second term aimed at slashing government spending. The two have since fallen out spectacularly over disagreements about the bill.

Musk said previously that he would start a new political party and spend money to unseat lawmakers who supported the bill.

Trump earlier this week threatened to cut off the billions of dollars in subsidies that Musk's companies receive from the federal government.

Asked on X what was the one thing that made him go from loving Trump to attacking him, Musk said: "Increasing the deficit from an already insane \$2T under Biden to \$2.5T. This will bankrupt the country." He referenced the growth... **P3**

### Ukraine Hits Russian Military Airbase

Ukraine launched a missile strike on a Russian military airbase in Voronezh, damaging a bomb depot and aircraft, according to reports.

Ukrainian forces have reportedly launched a targeted strike on a Russian military airfield in the Voronezh region, according to international media reports.

Reuters reported on Saturday, July 5, that the Borisoglebsk airbase in western Russia was hit during the operation. The base is known to be part of Russia's strategic air force infrastructure.

Ukrainian sources claim that the attack destroyed a bomb storage facility and damaged at least one aircraft. While independent verification remains limited, Ukrainian military intelligence has taken responsibility for the operation.

Russian security officials have confirmed the attack took place but have not provided full details about the extent of the damage. The Kremlin has yet to release an official statement.

This latest development follows a sharp rise in Russian airstrikes on Ukrainian cities in recent days, with several missile and drone attacks reported in Kyiv, Kharkiv, and other regions.

Earlier this year, Ukraine executed a complex assault that reportedly destroyed several Russian military aircraft at multiple airbases, highlighting its evolving capability to strike behind enemy lines.

Analysts suggest that Ukraine is shifting from a purely defensive posture to a more strategic offensive approach. Long-range precision attacks are increasingly being used to weaken Russian supply chains and air dominance.

The ongoing exchange of attacks reflects the intensifying nature of the conflict, with both sides attempting to gain tactical advantage through air operations and infrastructure targeting.



### At Least 24 Dead in Texas Flash Flooding; Two Dozen Young Campers Missing

Torrential rains unleashed flash floods along the Guadalupe River in Texas on Friday, killing at least 24 people as rescue teams scrambled to save dozens of victims trapped by high water or reported missing in the disaster, local



officials said.

Among the missing were 23 to 25 people listed as unaccounted for at an all-girls Christian summer camp located on the banks of the rain-engorged Guadalupe, authorities said. At a news conference late on Friday, almost... **P2**

### China Makes Strides in Curbing Groundwater Overexploitation



China has made substantial progress in curbing groundwater overexploitation in recent years, driven by efforts to reduce extraction and enhance replenishment, a government official said on Friday.

The number of provincial-level regions facing groundwater overexploitation has dropped from 21 in 2015 to 18 now, with the volume of overexploitation down by 31.9 percent compared to 2015 levels, Zhang Xiangwei, an official of the Ministry of Water Resources, told a press conference.

The improvement has been particularly striking in northern China, one of the country's most water-scarce regions, where groundwater overexploitation has been reduced by 85.8 percent compared to 2015 levels, according to Zhang.

Data from the ministry show that shallow groundwater levels in parts of the Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei region have risen by 3.19 meters since 2015, while deep groundwater levels have rebounded by an average of 8.46 meters.

To consolidate the progress, Zhang noted that China will adopt a comprehensive approach, including water conservation, industrial restructuring and enhanced replenishment efforts, to ensure the sustained recovery of groundwater levels.
